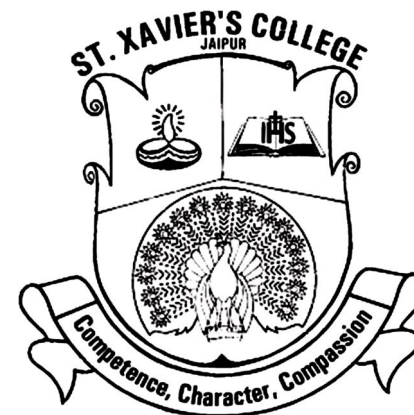

FOUNDER OF THE SOCIETY OF JESUS : SAINT IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA (1491-1556)



“Teach us to give and not to count the cost”

Passion for life

Inigo Lopez de Loyola was born in a noble family of the Basque Region in Spain, in 1491. He was the youngest of the 13 children of his parents. He later became a page in the service of a relative, Juan Velazquez de Cuellar, Treasurer of the kingdom of Castile. As a young aristocrat, Ignatius had a “love of martial exercises and a vain glorious desire for fame”. Joining the army at seventeen, he participated in many battles without injury. But when a French-Navarrese army stormed Pamplona's fortress on 20th May 1521, a cannon ball wounded one of his legs and broke the other. He was thirty, then. Soldiers carried the wounded Inigo to his ancestral home to recuperate. He had several surgical operations, which were very painful in the days before anaesthetics.

Passion for reading leads to a desire to change

During his days of recovery, he asked for books on chivalry, his favourite reading. But there were no such books in their Loyola castle. Instead he was given the only books in the house: the “Life of Christ” and a collection of the “Lives of the Saints”. Inigo set about reading them. The more he read and reflected, the more did God become the centre of his life. His injury at Pamplona was God's way of telling him that He wanted him in the service of Jesus Christ, the Eternal King.

Romantic Knight, now a passionate pilgrim of God

By March 1522, Inigo's right leg was sufficiently healed for him to put his plan into action. He undertook a pilgrimage to Mother Mary's altar at Montserrat, and spent the whole night kneeling or standing and praying. At dawn he renounced his sword and dagger, exchanging his fine clothes with a beggar's sackcloth-tunic. A romantic knight now became a passionate Pilgrim of God.

A docile student of God, the 'School-Master'

Inigo became God's student. On his way to Barcelona, he stopped at Manresa, a town on the banks of the river Cardoner. There he spent ten months in total communion with God. He spent seven hours a day in prayer in a cave he had discovered. For several hours a day he helped the sick in the hospital of St Lucy. God, he said, was like a School Master teaching him step by step. He recorded the meditations and the illuminations he received in prayer in a notebook he carried. It was from this little book that his famous Book of Meditations, called the “Spiritual Exercises” would later emerge.

Passion to lead people to God makes him a dedicated student

Inigo's only desire was to help people to come closer to God. In order to do that, he needed to study. At the age of 34, he began to study Latin grammar, sitting in class with young boys. He then studied at the renowned Universities at Alcala and then at Salamanca. At the age of 38, he went to Paris and studied Philosophy and Theology for seven years.

A magnetic personality attracts many good student-friends

In Paris, he shared a room with Peter Faber and Francis Xavier. His magnetic personality attracted many young people to him: James Laynez, Alphonsus Salmeron, Nicholas Bobadilla and Simon Rodrigues. He was for them a friend, philosopher and spiritual guide. With three more, Claude Le Jay, Paschase Broet, and John Codure who came later, Ignatius started the 'Society of Jesus' in 1540 to love God and serve humanity.

A teacher and educationist with a heart for the downtrodden

Ignatius always had a passion to teach. He taught the lettered and the unlettered, the rich and the poor, elders and children. He taught them about God, religion and prayer and cared for the sick in hospitals. He started the Roman College in 1551 as a model for all colleges throughout the world. In 1552, he opened a college in Rome for the Seminarians to prepare themselves better to preach Christ.

Inigo becomes St Ignatius of Loyola

Ignatius died on 31st July 1556. When the body was made ready for visitors, there was a long line of Cardinals, Bishops, Priests, the Nobility and the poor of Rome, all coming to kiss the holy venerable hands of Ignatius. He was declared a Saint by the Church in 1622. The 31st July, the day he died, is celebrated worldwide, every year, as his Feast Day.



SAINT FRANCIS XAVIER PATRON OF THE COLLEGE



“In Thee, O Lord, have I put my hope. Let me never be confounded.”

– St Francis Xavier

Francis Xavier was the 6th child of Don Juan and Dona Maria of Xavier Castle in Navarre, Spain. After his schooling at home, he joined the University of Paris and obtained a Master's Degree. He was looking forward to a brilliant academic career at the University when, providentially, Ignatius of Loyola, a fellow-student, challenged him with the question, “What does it profit a man, if he gains the whole world and suffers the loss of his own soul?” (Mark 8:36) At first, Xavier did not pay serious attention to the question but when it was asked repeatedly, Xavier was persuaded and he joined the small, select band of companions of Ignatius, who later came to be known as the Jesuits. Ignatius inspired and guided Xavier to seek nobler ideals and more challenging goals, namely, to follow Christ and spread the Good News of the Kingdom of God and to win souls for Christ. Once these compelling ideals and goals became clearer to Xavier, there was no turning back. When King John of Portugal and Pope Paul III desired to send missionaries to the East, Francis Xavier became the man of destiny. Given only a day's notice, he left Lisbon, and set sail for India, reaching Goa on 6 May 1542.

Like a blazing meteor, Xavier travelled across the Malabar Coast stretching from Goa to Tuticorin and the Coromandel Coast, reaching in his journeys even the Island of Ceylon (Sri Lanka). Then, crossing the sea, he reached Malacca and proceeded to Molucca Islands. He visited the Spice Islands and finally reached Japan from the Macao base. In ten short years, despite the interminable delays of sea travel, Xavier made three trips to the East. The flourishing Christian communities that dot the coastline of India and the eastern lands even today, more than four and a half centuries later, are a striking testimony to the faith, the zeal and the untiring labours of this man on a mission, this Saint in a hurry. Xavier's last journey to enter the impenetrable Chinese mainland did not succeed, as he died on 3 December 1552 at the age of 46 at the threshold of China, on the island of Sancian, his eyes fixed on the mainland, where his heart already was. His incorrupt body is still preserved and venerated in the Basilica of Bom Jesu in Goa. During the period of eleven and a half years, Xavier had travelled about eighty thousand kilometres in over fifty kingdoms baptizing over thirty thousand people from various beliefs and cultures. He was appointed the first Indian Jesuit Provincial in 1551. He started the first institution of Christian Higher Education, namely, St Paul's College, Goa. In 1662 Pope Gregory XV canonised Francis Xavier together with Ignatius of Loyola. St Francis has been declared as the patron of the Oriental Church.

JESUITS AROUND THE WORLD (THE SOCIETY OF JESUS)

The Society of Jesus is an international Catholic Religious Organisation of men founded in the year 1540 by St Ignatius of Loyola with the motto of working for the 'Greater Glory of God' by rendering service to humanity. It is led by its Superior General, currently Very Rev. Fr. Arturo Sosa SJ. and its headquarters are situated in Rome. The members of this Organisation are popularly known as the 'Jesuits'. There are around 16,378 men working in 120 countries spread out in 6 continents. Of them, around 4,000 are working in India and more than 100 are working in Delhi Province. Today, the Jesuits render their services in schools and colleges, youth and social service centres, in parishes and missions, in spirituality and counselling centres and in almost every form of service and ministry in the Church. Although the work of the Jesuits encompasses a wide range of works, they are best known for their educational work. Right from the inception, the Jesuits have been among the best teachers and educationists. At

one time, they were called 'the School Masters of Europe'. In the world, the Jesuits have over 3,897 Educational Institutions in 96 countries. These Jesuit Educational Institutions engage the efforts of approximately 1,34,303 teachers, educating approximately 29,28,806 students. In India the Society of Jesus has founded 118 Primary & Middle Schools, 400 High Schools, 58 University Colleges, 22 Technical Institutes and 16 Business Administrations Institutes with 11,525 teachers, educating 3,34,538 students, belonging to every social class, community and linguistic group.

Jesuit Education

- It assists in the total formation of each individual within the human community. It includes a spiritual dimension that permeates the entire education; it promotes dialogue between faith and culture.
- It emphasises active involvement on the part of the student and encourages lifelong openness to growth.
- It is a preparation for active life-commitment. It serves the faith that promotes justice; seeks to form “men and women for others” and manifests a particular concern for the poor.
- It relies on the spirit of community among administrators, teachers, parents, alumni, and benefactors in an atmosphere that promotes unity.

UNIVERSAL APOSTOLIC PREFERENCES (UAP)

The Preferences give a horizon, a point of reference to the whole Society of Jesus. They capture our imaginations and awaken our desires. They unite us in our mission.

The Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAP) that are the fruit of a process of discernment have been laid down to carry forward the vision of Ignatius. The Preferences give a horizon, a point of reference to the whole Society of Jesus. The new Preferences are four areas vital for our world today. The Society of Jesus will pay special attention to them in the next ten years, 2019-29. They are:

1. **Showing the way to God** – In other words, to Show the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment.

2. **Walking with the Excluded** - Walk with the poor, the outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice.
3. **Journeying with Youth** - Accompany young people in the creation of a hope-filled future.
4. **Caring for our Common Home** - Collaborate, with Gospel depth, for the protection and renewal of God's Creation.

THE JESUITS IN RAJASTHAN

The Jesuit mission to the north of India goes back to 1580. In the year 1579, Emperor Akbar invited the Jesuits from Goa to visit his court, mainly to get Catholic debaters for an interfaith forum held regularly in Akbar's palace at Fatehpur Sikri. The first Jesuits, arrived at the Mughal court in 1580, and the Mughal Mission, which lasted with two interruptions till 1773, was in the initial stages directed by two accomplished missionaries in the Jesuit's first century, Rudolfo Aquaviva (1550-83) and Fr. Jerome Xavier (1549-1617), the grandnephew of St. Francis Xavier. Approximately a century and a half after their arrival at Fatehpur Sikri, the Jesuits made inroads into Rajasthan. They first came to Jaipur in 1729 at the invitation of Maharaja Sawai Jai Singh II in order to help him set up an astronomical observatory known as Jantar Mantar at his then new capital of Jaipur.

The Jesuits came back to Jaipur in 1941, the 400th anniversary year of St. Francis Xavier's arrival to India, at the invitation of the Bishop and Mirza Ismail, the then Prime Minister of Jaipur. The Bishop offered them St. Mary's School at Ghat Gate, which was started in 1941 by Fr. Ignatius OFM – Captain, under the patronage of the Bishop of Ajmer. Later, in 1945, the school was shifted to its present site under a new name—St. Xavier's School. Ever since, the school has educated thousands of students who have excelled in life by holding key positions in every walk of life not only in Rajasthan but all over India and even abroad. The Jaipur Xavier Educational Association (JXEA) was established in 1950, as a trust managed by the Jesuits. In 2006, Xavier Vocational College (XVI) was started in Jaipur to give vocational training to the economically weaker sections of society.

ABOUT RAJASTHAN

Rajasthan which is also known as the “Land of Maharajas” is the largest state of India, covering an area of about 342,239 sq. km. It comprises 33 districts and its largest city is Jaipur, which is also its capital. Being located on the western side of the country, it shares its border with Pakistan to its northwest and to the west it shares its border with Sindh. To its north it has Punjab, Uttar Pradesh and Haryana to its northeast; to its southeast it has Madhya Pradesh and Gujarat to its southwest. The glory of the state is retained by its majestic palaces, forts and monuments. The vibrant culture and rich heritage of this princely state draw innumerable tourists from across the globe. Its major attractions include the ruins of Indus Valley Civilization, the oldest mountain range- Aravalli, a Jain pilgrimage site known as Dilwara Temples, Karni Mata Mandir, the only hill station of Rajasthan- Mount Abu, Keoladeo National Park (formerly known as Bharatpur National Park, the Ranthambore National Park and the Sariska Tiger Reserve. Some of its major architectural wonders include Chittorgarh fort - the largest fort in Asia, Mehrangarh Fort at Jodhpur, Jaipur “The Pink City” houses a number of well-known tourists' spots which include Hawa Mahal (Palace of Winds), Lake Palace, City Palace, Amber Palace, Jantar Mantar, Umaid Bhawan in Jodhpur, Jaisalmer Fort in Jaisalmer and many more. Not only this, the princely state of Rajasthan hosts varied colorful fairs and festivals which are known for their uniqueness and captivates a large number of tourists from India and overseas every year, some of which are Pushkar Fair, Jaipur Literature Festival, Jodhpur Flamenco Gypsy Festival, Jaipur Heritage International Festival, Desert Festival, Urs at Ajmer, and Teej to name a few.

ABOUT JAIPUR

Jaipur, popularly known as the “Pink City”, and “Paris of India”, is the capital of Rajasthan state, India. Jaipur is worldwide famous for its Architecture, Vastu, Astrology, Forts, Monuments, Palaces, Art and Craft, Culture and last but not least for unique Food. Founded in 1727 by Maharaja Sawai Jai Singh II, a Kachwaha (Suryavanshi/ claiming descent from the sun) Rajput. Initially his capital was Amber, which lies at a distance of 11 km from Jaipur. He felt the need of shifting his capital city owing to growing population and scarcity of water. Jaipur is the first planned city of India and the King took great interest in designing the city. Keeping in mind the several battles fought with the Marathas,

Jai Singh was keen on making his city safe and secure. Hence, the construction of the city was brilliantly planned and executed. The architecture of the city was certainly ahead of its time and was perhaps the best and the most advanced, at that time, in the Indian subcontinent. In 1878, when the Prince of Wales visited Jaipur, the whole city was painted in Pink colour to welcome him and after that Jaipur was titled 'Pink City'. Jaipur is steeped in history and culture. Here the past comes alive in magnificent forts and palaces, blushed pink, where once lived the maharajas. The bustling bazaars of Jaipur, famous for Rajasthani jewellery, fabric and shoes, possess a timeless quality and are surely a treasure-trove for the shoppers. This fascinating city with its romantic charm takes you to an epoch of royalty and tradition.

ABOUT THE COLLEGE

In 2010, the J.X.E.A (Jaipur Xavier Educational Association) in collaboration with the Xavier Alumni/ae and the well-wishers of Jaipur under the leadership of Rev Fr Varkey Perekatt SJ, initiated a Higher Education Programme by establishing St. Xavier's College, Jaipur to continue the work that St. Xavier wanted to do—promote human fulfilment by means of training and education in India following the motto of the founder of the Society of Jesus, St. Ignatius, to work for 'the greater glory of God' (*Ad majorem dei gloriam*).

Since then, the College has grown in manifold directions, serving the educational needs, not only of the people of Jaipur but also across the Nation. Over the last 10 years we have grown from a sapling to a huge oak, from around 350 pupils to over 2100 students, from just five streams –B.A.(Honours)- English, Economics, BBA, BCA and B.Com. to programmes in M.A.(English), M.A.(Economics), M. Com. (EAFM) and M. Com (HRM) along with B.A. Honours in Political Science, Psychology, B.A.(Pass course) and B.Sc. Pass Course.

St Xavier's College, Jaipur, from the academic session 2021-22 will function from its sprawling premises in Nevta, on the Ajmer Road. The merger of the two colleges: Hathroi Fort, Jaipur, and Nevta, Jaipur, was formalized in a grand function held at the Nevta premises with the blessings of Rev. Fr. Soosai Mani SJ (Provincial, Jesuits Delhi Province) who presided over the formal ceremony of the merger held on 6 April, 2021. The new College with the combined faculties and students of both units will function under the stewardship of Rev. Fr. Dr. Arokya Swamy SJ (Manager, St Xavier's College Nevta) and Rev. Fr. Dr. A Rex Angelo SJ (Principal, St Xavier's College Jaipur).



THE MEANING OF THE COLLEGE EMBLEM

The motto on the college crest : Competence, Character and Compassion encodes the core values sought by the college, and challenges every student who passes through the portals of St. Xavier's College to realize in one's own life the high ideals of the college: acquiring personal integrity and excellence in everything one does.

The burning lamp represents Lord Jesus Christ who said, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12), and the Wisdom of God. True education leads one from the darkness of ignorance to the light of genuine knowledge and enlightenment.

The open book symbolizes the centuries old quality educational tradition of the Jesuits and their commitment to carry it forward. The inscription "IHS," placed above the open book, is taken from the official seal of the Society of Jesus, used by the founder St. Ignatius of Loyola. These are the first three letters of the Latinized Greek word IHSOUS, meaning 'Jesus'. The cross shown above the letter 'H' reminds the world that Jesus Christ died on the Cross for the salvation of mankind.

The peacock is the national bird of India. It symbolizes beauty, grace, and pride in the natural resources and cultural diversity of India. It inspires a sense of mysticism encouraging us to aim for higher values.

OUR INSPIRATION

The education offered at St. Xavier's College, Jaipur aspires to reach the ideal of St. Ignatius encapsulated in the catch word *magis*, meaning "better than the best". Every activity is in line with the definite stand taken by the Society of Jesus with regard to reaching this ideal in education all over the world. This stand is inspired and moulded by a document on Jesuit education prepared in 1986, on the occasion of the 400th anniversary of *Ratio Studiorum* (Plan of studies drawn up by the Jesuits when they entered into the field of education), by the International Commission on the Apostolate of Jesuit Education (ICAJE) and presented to the whole Society by the then General Fr. Peter Hans Kolvenbach, S.J.

The document confers on Jesuit education the following characteristics:

Person Oriented : by paying individual attention to each student and making teaching and learning student centred.

Integral Formation and Development : by paying special attention to intellectual, effective, imaginative, aesthetic, creative, critical, communicative, physical, cultural, moral and spiritual aspects of the individual.

Faith in God and Religious Experience : by promoting well-formed and strongly-held beliefs in one's faith, tradition and deepening one's relationship with God.

Value-based Leadership : by ensuring a consistent focus on personal integrity and ethical behaviour in all professions, and the appropriate balance between justice and fairness.

Commitment to Excellence : by practically applying well-learned lessons and skills to achieve new ideas, better solutions and vital answers.

Relevant to the Times : by adapting to the concrete situations, politically, socially and culturally.

Service that Promotes Justice : by using learning and leadership in open-handed and generous ways to ensure freedom of inquiry, the pursuit of truth and care for others.

Participative: by encouraging interaction among the pupil, parents and teachers.

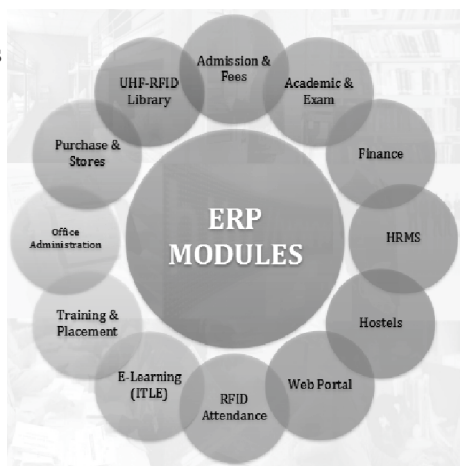

UGC ANTI RAGGING UNDERTAKING BY STUDENTS AND PARENTS/GUARDIANS

Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee

As per the guidelines of UGC and the Supreme Court, an Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee has been established by St. Xavier's College Jaipur, to provide a healthy and congenial atmosphere for the staff and students of the institution. The committee aims to create an environment that permeates gendered equality and safety to avert any form of sexual harassment and simultaneously upholds confidence amidst all the components that requisite action will be taken against any malfeasance in the institution. The committee conducts enquiry through forming an **Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)**, at the time of any complaint, in order to suggest suitable action, as per the legal format of Vishakha Guidelines, Sexual Harassment at the Workplace Act 2013 and GOI's Instructions concerning the same.

ADMINISTRATIVE GUIDELINES AND NORMS

1. DISCIPLINE

1. Students are expected to dress and to conduct themselves in a proper manner.
2. All forms of ragging are prohibited. If any incident of ragging comes to the notice of the authorities, the student will be given the opportunity to explain. If the explanation is not found to be satisfactory, the authorities can expel him/her from the college.
3. Students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that provides a safe working environment for women.

2. ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

1. The University prescribes a minimum of 75% attendance. The College insists on regular attendance in all classes. So unless there is a real necessity, no one should absent oneself from class. When absenting from class, a leave letter duly signed by the parent or guardian should be presented to the Office in advance. If the absence is due to any unforeseen circumstance, the leave letter should be submitted on the Day of return.
2. Students going for Sports, NCC/NSS camps, cultural competition and other extracurricular activities as on duty should get prior permission from the Principal through the Professor in-charge of these programs.
3. The attendance shall be communicated to the students at regular intervals. Frequent absenteeism shall be reported to the Guardian.
4. Failure in observing rules regarding attendance will entail the loss of attendance and this may disqualify the student from appearing for the University Examinations.
5. In case of prolonged absence on account of medical reasons, a medical certificate ought to be submitted to the Principal within fifteen days of absence.

6. Students permitted to attend approved academic and co-curricular activities, conferences may be considered to be on duty.

3. FEE SUBMISSION:

1. The fee structure is determined by JXEA from time to time and is subject to revision without notice. Fee is paid in four instalments in the academic year 2021-22.
2. The first instalment falls due in the month of July, second in September, third in November and the last in the month of January.
3. Note: Scholarship and Fee Concession applications will be considered after the first internal exam and before the due date of the last installment. Students should fulfill the required criteria for availing the same and application for scholarship/fee concession should be submitted at the college office latest by 15th October 2021 on Email ID : scholarship.sxcj@stxaviersjaipur.org.
4. Deadlines for dropping a course: 30th September, 2021 or till the university examination forms are filled, whichever is earlier.
5. If you plan to drop a course and would like to be reimbursed for fees paid in advance, you need to complete a refund form within the stipulated time as outlined in the Fees handbook.

4. ID CARD

1. St. Xavier's College, Jaipur issues photo ID Card to each and every student, after granting him/her admission, which is valid during his/her period of study in the College.
2. The student ID Card is for identification purposes only. Each student is mandatorily responsible for the use of his/her student ID Card in the college premises, University Exam, in any other academic activity/event or participation in co-curricular activities held inside/outside the campus.
3. The student ID Card is not transferable to any other person. Students must ensure that their ID Cards are kept secured and are not deliberately or inadvertently made available for use by any other person.

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4. The student ID Card must be presented at the request of an authorized person of the college. Any student refusing to provide the same may invite disciplinary action against him/her.
 5. Alteration, falsification or misuse of the student ID Card is a violation of Students' Code of Conduct and will be dealt accordingly that can include a severe disciplinary action against him/her. Fraudulent use of the student ID Card may also result in criminal charges and/or civil proceedings as deemed fit.
 6. A student who has lost his/her student ID Card, must report the same to the Principal of the college as soon as possible to invalidate the issued card and apply for a replacement by completing the appropriate application form. Until the loss is reported and the old card invalidated, the student may be held responsible for any unauthorized use of that card.
 7. Replacement of student ID Card due to loss, damage, theft or change in name will attract a charge as determined by the college.
 8. Student ID Card is the property of the College. Students must have to return their ID Cards to the College for cancellation upon withdrawal/ termination or successful completion of studies.
 9. Upon completion or cessation of studies, the student must no longer use the student ID Card for proof of his/her student status for any purpose.

5. LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION AND INTERNSHIP CONSENT RULES

1. Students should provide his/her curriculum vitae along with an application stating the reason for the requirement of LoR.
2. Give at least four, or preferably five weeks' notice for the request.
3. Students should approach the instructor or mentor who knows them well and can speak of both their academic and personal strengths.
4. The student should get the rough draft approved by the concerned teacher and the HoD.

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5. After the approval, the LoR or Internship Application draft should be mailed at office@stxaviersjaipur.org for signatures on the Letter Head.
 6. The student should submit a copy of the final LOR to the respective department.
 7. In case the LoR is for an internship, the student should also submit a copy of the certificate of completion issued by the company to the department after the internship is over.
 8. If the LoR is for further study, the student should email either the HOD or the office stating whether the student got admission in the desired institution or course or not.

6. SPORTS FACILITIES

1. Sports play a pivotal role in shaping one's personality and good health. St. Xavier's College, Jaipur provides facilities on and near college for sportsmen who are interested in tournaments conducted by the University of Rajasthan.
2. We have specially developed a sports environment that matches international standards and gives a truly global experience to all our students.
3. The campus has a multi-purpose track, a hockey ground, facilities for cricket, basketball, volleyball, shuttle badminton and throw-ball.
4. Facilities for Indoor sports such as table tennis, carrom and chess have also been provided.
5. Students at the college take part in Zonal, Inter-zone and Varsity Level Tournaments. Elite sportsmen and women are trained by specialist coaches.

7. RESIDENCE OF STUDENTS

Every student not residing with his/her close relative or staying as a paying guest in or around Jaipur should furnish the details of their residence to the coordinator/Vice principal in due time.

8. HOSTEL FACILITY

St. Xavier's College Hostel is an integral part of St. Xavier's College. It is located within the college campus, thus helping students save on travelling time and related expenses. Boys and girls have separate places of accommodation and study, though the mess and many other facilities are common.

9. TRANSPORT FACILITY

The College has made a safe and secure arrangement of transport facilities for students. It is available from all major areas of Jaipur. The college has issued guidelines regarding the same which all the students have to follow, failing which they can be denied this facility.

10. MENTORING SYSTEM

1. St. Xavier's College, Jaipur has implemented an effective Mentor-Mentee System for the students to promote a better understanding between the teacher and the students.
2. Students are under the personal care of a Mentor, who meets them in a group on a regular basis for proper guidance and counselling.
3. Class-wise parent-teacher meetings are held at the end of every term after the internal exams for discussing the result, performance and general conduct of the ward, both at home and in the college.

11. STUDENT APPRAISAL DIARY

All students will be provided a diary in which they have to maintain a record of their participation in different activities. This would be verified by the coordinator of the committee and the class mentor.

12. STUDENTS' COUNCIL

1. Students' Council (SC) is the representative body of the entire student community of Xavier's College. It is an interface between the students, professors and the administration, and we work together to identify and address concerns that affect the students directly and indirectly. It represents the interests of the students and

participates in discussions and decisions that affect the student community. SC aims at the all-round development of students and organises several extracurricular events throughout the year in association with the various activity clubs on campus. It coordinates the student volunteer effort for the College events that are organised periodically. It also provides an opportunity to be a part of activities, motivated by our sense of social responsibility and aimed at giving back to society. 1. LIBRARY

Rules and Regulations to be followed in the College Library :

In such cases, the reader shall be held responsible unless these are brought to the notice of the library staff at the time of issue.
14. Students should return books within a week after completing their respective semester/yearly examinations, otherwise a fine will be charged.

15. Each student shall obtain a No dues certificate from the library after returning all the books issued.
16. Students can demand or request any book through OPAC.
17. No bags and personal books are allowed in the library.
18. The students are expected to be silent in the library.
19. No discussion is permitted inside the library
20. Use of mobile phones is not allowed in the library.

Covid-19 Guidelines issued by College Management & Government of Rajasthan

The College will strictly follow the SOP issued by the State Government dated 12.08.2021. Only those students whose consent form has been received by the College will be allowed to attend the regular classes and other activities in the campus.

This SOP outlines various generic precautionary measures to be strictly adopted by all (Teachers, employees, and students) in the College at all times:

1. Only 50% of students will be allowed to attend the in-person classes every day. Classes are planned for a 6 day-week on the basis of Odd and Even roll numbers. Parallel classes will be conducted online for the rest of the students. (Odd numbers: Day 1/Day 3/Day 5 - Even Numbers – Day 2/Day 4/Day 6).
2. Please note that all students will attend in-person classes for 3 days (in college) and online classes for 3 days (at Home) in a week as per the regular timetable.
3. Students and Staff will enter the College after thermal screening at entrance gate and sanitising their hands through separate Entry Gate (Left Wing Ramp Gate for students and Reception Gate for staff & visitors).
4. It is mandatory for all students to get the first dose of vaccine if they wish to attend in-person classes. They should carry the First Dose Vaccination Certificate in their mobile for verification.
5. Physical distancing of at least 6 feet is to be followed at all times.
6. Crowding inside the campus, shaking hands, maintaining close contact with friends will not be permitted especially at Entry and Exit points.
7. Use of face covers/masks is mandatory at all times even while travelling in public/college transport. College will adhere to the 'No Mask No Entry' Policy.
8. A separate fogging machine will be functional at the main entrance of the

College throughout working hours. Sanitisation of classrooms, corridors, washrooms, and other common places will be done on a daily basis.

9. Wash your hands frequently with soap (for at least 40-60 seconds) even when your hands are not visibly dirty. Liquid soap dispensers are placed in all washing areas.
10. Use of alcohol-based hand sanitisers (for at least 20 seconds) can be done wherever feasible.
11. Students should bring their own sanitiser, towel, water bottle, and food items from home.
12. Students and Staff are advised to install and use 'Aarogya Setu' & 'RajCovid Info' Apps in their mobiles.
13. Respiratory etiquettes are to be strictly followed. This involves strict practice of covering one's mouth and nose while coughing/sneezing with a tissue/handkerchief/flexed elbow and proper disposing off used tissues.
14. Exchange of drinking water, textbooks, stationery items, and food items will not be permitted.
15. Self-monitoring of health by all and reporting to authorities any illness at the earliest are to be done. Avoid attending classes if symptoms like fever, headache, cough, and cold are present.
16. Spitting is strictly prohibited anywhere inside the campus.
17. Students must wear clean clothes and maintain hygiene in the campus.
18. A separated 'Isolation Room' within the College premises will be allotted for emergency cases.
19. Students will not be allowed to enter any other classroom except their own.
20. Canteen services will not be operational inside the campus for the time being.
21. While teaching is on, both the teachers and students will continue to wear masks.
