

## THE FOUNDER OF THE SOCIETY OF JESUS SAINT IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA

During the long recovery Ignatius asked for some romance novels to pass the time. All the hospital had, were books on the life of Christ and the saints. Desperate from boredom, Ignatius began to read them. As he read the saints, he saw their lives more and more worth imitating. However, he continued his daydreams of fame, wealth and the fantasies of winning the love of a certain noble lady of the court. However, Ignatius received an insight that would mark his life and the history of Christianity.

When he read the Life of Christ's and the Loves of Saints' lives, he felt a deep peace, joy, and an increase of love and confidence in God. On the contrary, when he fantasized about a life with women and riches and honors, he was filled with uncertainty, doubt, fear, and no real awareness of God. From here he began to develop what is called "The Rules for the Discernment of Spirits." He ended up writing down basic rules to help a person sift through the different moods and movements within one's heart to see which ones were from God embrace these thoughts and desires and to discern which thoughts and desires were from the enemy and reject those. These rules came from Ignatius paying close attention to his own heart's movements during his time in the hospital. Eventually, Ignatius gave up his old pursuits and left the hospital a new man. He decided to travel to Jerusalem to walk in the same places as our Lord. Although Ignatius now wanted to serve the Lord, he was not yet a saint. During his trip, he met a foreign man. They were both riding on mules and they began discussing the truths of the faith. The man told Ignatius that he didn't believe in Mary's perpetual virginity. Ignatius was enraged, and as the man rode off down one path Ignatius wanted to kill this man to honor our Lady. Ignatius decided at the fork in the road, he would let his mule decide. If it went down the same path as the man he would kill him, if not he would go on peacefully. The mule went down the other path and Ignatius went on with his journey. As the years went on, Ignatius got ordained, began a religious order known as the Society of Jesus also known as the Jesuits, and worked diligently in Rome for the sake of his order throughout the world. He died due to stomach complications, most likely because of his extreme fasts. His order continues and runs several universities across the globe.



St. Ignatius is a model of passion for us. So many world religions involve the removal of desires or emotions and the ignoring of personal experience. It's easy to fall into this trap by thinking that spirituality is about getting rid of the bodily dimension of our existence. But for St. Ignatius and the Catholic tradition God took on human nature in Jesus and by doing so affirmed all that is authentically human. In fact, throughout the gospels Jesus invites us to tell him our desires: "What are you seeking? (Jn 1:38)," "What do you want me to do for you? (Mk 10:51)," "Do you want to be well? (Jn 5:6)." So, with the help of St. Ignatius, let us tell God what we desire for Him to do for us. St. Ignatius, pray for us.

# PATRON OF THE COLLEGE SAINT FRANCIS XAVIER



Prayer is powerful! It fills the earth with mercy, it makes the Divine clemency pass from generation to generation; right along the course of the centuries wonderful works have been achieved through prayer. – **Francis Xavier** 

Francis Xavier was the 6th child of Don Juan and Dona Maria of Xavier Castle in Navarre, Spain. After his schooling at home, he joined the University of Paris and obtained a Master's Degree. He was looking forward to a brilliant academic career at the University when, providentially, Ignatius of Loyola, a fellow-student, challenged him with the question, "What does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and suffers the loss of his own soul?" (Mark 8:36) At first, Xavier did not pay serious attention to the question, but when it was asked repeatedly, Xavier was persuaded, and he joined the small, select band of companions of Ignatius, who later came to be known as the Jesuits. Ignatius inspired and guided Xavier to seek nobler ideals and more challenging goals, namely, to follow Christ and spread the Good News of the Kingdom of God and to win souls for Christ. Once these compelling ideals and goals became clearer to Xavier, there was no turning back.

When King John of Portugal and Pope Paul III desired to send missionaries to the East, Francis Xavier became the man of destiny. Given only a day's notice, he left for Lisbon, and setting sail for India, reached Goa on 6 May 1542.

Like a blazing meteor, Xavier traveled across the Malabar Coast stretching from Goa to Tuticorin and the Coromandel Coast, reaching in his journeys even the Island of Ceylon (Sri Lanka). Then, crossing the sea, he reached Malacca and proceeded to the Molucca Islands. He visited the Spice Islands and finally reached Japan from the Macao base. In ten short years, despite the interminable delays of sea travel, Xavier made three trips to the East. The flourishing Christian communities that dot the coastline of India and the eastern lands even today, more than four and a half centuries later, are a striking testimony to the faith, the zeal, and the untiring labours of this man on a mission, this Saint in a hurry. Xavier's last journey to enter the impenetrable Chinese mainland did not succeed, as he died on 3 December 1552 at the age of 46 at the threshold of China, on the island of Sancian, his eyes fixed on the mainland, where his heart already was.

During the period of eleven and a half years, Xavier had travelled about eighty thousand kilometers in over fifty kingdoms baptizing over thirty thousand people from various beliefs and cultures. He was appointed the first Indian Jesuit Provincial in 1551. He started the first institution of Christian Higher Education, namely, St. Paul's College, Goa. In 1662 Pope Gregory XV canonized Francis Xavier together with Ignatius of Loyola. St. Francis has been declared as the patron of the Oriental Church. His incorrupt body is still preserved and venerated in the Basilica of Bom Jesus, Goa.

#### JESUITS AROUND THE WORLD (THE SOCIETY OF JESUS)

The Society of Jesus is an international Catholic Religious Organisation of men founded in the year 1540 by St Ignatius of Loyola with the motto of working for the 'Greater Glory of God' by rendering service to humanity. It is led by its Superior General, currently Very Rev. Fr. Arturo Sosa SJ and its headquarters are situated in Rome.

The members of this Organisation are popularly known as the 'Jesuits'. Around 16,378 men are working in 120 countries spread out in 6 continents. Of them, around 4,000 are working in India and more than 100 are working in Delhi Province. Today, the Jesuits render their services in schools and Colleges, youth and social service centres, parishes and missions, in spirituality and counselling centres and in almost every form of service and ministry in the Church.

Although the work of the Jesuits encompasses a wide range of works, they are best known for their educational work. Right from its inception, the Jesuits have been among the best teachers and educationists. At one time, they were called 'the School Masters of Europe'. In the world today, Jesuits are responsible for 3,897 Educational Institutions in 96 countries.

These Institutions engage the efforts of approximately 1,34,303 teachers, educating approximately 29,28,806 students. In India, The Society of Jesus has founded 118 Primary and Middle Schools, 149 High Schools, 58 University Colleges, 22 Technical Institutes, 16 Business administration institutes, 12 Colleges of Education, and 3 Engineering Colleges with 11,525 teachers, educating 3,34,538 students, belonging to every social class. community, and linguistic group.

Our education is accessible to all people from different socio-economic backgrounds. Besides, Jesuits also run 61 Jesuit Refugee service education projects offered across 22 countries.



#### THE JESUITS IN RAJASTHAN

The Jesuit mission to the north of India goes back to 1580. In the year 1579, Emperor Akbar invited the Jesuits from Goa to visit his court, mainly to get Catholic debaters for an interfaith forum held regularly in Akbar's palace at Fatehpur Sikri. The first Jesuits arrived at the Mughal court in 1580, and the Mughal Mission, which lasted with two interruptions till 1773. The initial stages were directed by two accomplished missionaries in the Jesuit's first century, Rudolfo Aquaviva (1550-83) and Fr. Jerome Xavier (1549-1617), the grandnephew of St. Francis Xavier.

Approximately a century and a half after they arrived at Fatehpur Sikri, the Jesuits reached Rajasthan. They first came to Jaipur in 1729 at the invitation of Maharaja Sawai Jai Singh II to help him set up an astronomical observatory known as Jantar Mantar at his then-new capital of Jaipur.

The Jesuits came back to Jaipur in 1941, the 400th anniversary year of St. Francis Xavier's arrival to India, at the invitation of the Bishop and Mirza Ismail, the then prime minister of Jaipur. The bishop offered them St. Mary's School at Ghat Gate, which was started in 1941 by Fr. Ignatius OFM, Captain under the patronage of the Bishop of Ajmer. Later, in 1945, the school was shifted to its present site under a new name—St. Xavier's School. Ever since, the school has educated thousands of students who have excelled in life by holding key positions in every walk of life not only in Rajasthan but all over India and even abroad.



#### ABOUT RAJASTHAN

Rajasthan which is also known as the "Land of Maharajas" is the largest state of India, covering an area of about 342,239 sq. km. It comprises 33 districts and its largest city is Jaipur, which is also its capital. Being located on the western side of the country, it shares its border with Pakistan to its northwest and to the west, it shares its border with Sindh. To its north, it has Punjab, Uttar Pradesh and Haryana to its northeast; to its southeast, it has Madhya Pradesh and Gujarat to its southwest. The glory of the state is retained by its majestic palaces, forts and monuments. The vibrant culture and rich heritage of this princely state draw innumerable tourists from across the globe. Its major attractions include the ruins of Indus Valley Civilization, the oldest mountain range- Aravalli, a Jain pilgrimage site known as Dilwara Temples, Karni Mata Mandir, the only hill station of Rajasthan- Mount Abu, Keoladeo National Park (formerly known as Bharatpur National Park, the Ranthambore National Park and the Sariska Tiger Reserve. Some of its major architectural wonders include Chittorgarh fort - the largest fort in Asia, Mehrangarh Fort at Jodhpur. Jaipur "The Pink City" houses a number of well-known tourists' spots which include Hawa Mahal (Palace of Winds), Lake Palace, City Palace, Amber Palace, Jantar Mantar, Umaid Bhawan in Jodhpur, Jaisalmer Fort in Jaisalmer and many more. Not only this, the princely state of Rajasthan hosts varied colourful fairs and festivals which are known for their uniqueness and captivates a large number of tourists from India and overseas every year, some of which are Pushkar Fair, Jaipur Literature Festival, Jodhpur Flamenco Gypsy Festival, Jaipur Heritage International Festival, Desert Festival, Urs at Ajmer, and Teej, to name a few.

#### **ABOUT JAIPUR**

Jaipur, renowned as the "Pink City" and the "Paris of India," serves as the capital of Rajasthan, India. It enjoys global acclaim for its architectural marvels, Vastu, astrology, forts, monuments, palaces, art, crafts, culture, and distinctive cuisine. Established in 1727 by Maharaja Sawai Jai Singh II, a Kachwaha Rajput tracing their lineage to the sun, Jaipur replaced Amber as the capital due to population growth and water scarcity. As India's first planned city, it was meticulously designed with safety in mind, especially given the battles with the Marathas. In 1878, Jaipur turned pink to welcome the Prince of Wales, earning its moniker "Pink City." Steeped in history and culture, Jaipur's blushing forts and palaces bring the past to life, while its bustling bazaars offer a timeless shopping experience. This captivating city, with its romantic charm, transports you to an era of royalty and tradition.



#### ABOUT THE COLLEGE

The Jaipur Xavier Educational Association (J.X.E.A.) established in 1950, as a registered charitable society managed by the Jesuits, has been pursuing the legacy of St. Francis Xavier of promoting human fulfilment using training and education in India. Following the motto of the founder of the Society of Jesus, St. Ignatius, the college has been working for "The Greater Glory of God" (Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam). In 2006, the Xavier Vocational Institute (X.V.I.) was set up in Jaipur to give vocational training to the weaker sections of society. In 2010, the J.X.E.A. in collaboration with the Xavier Alumni/ae and the well-wishers of Jaipur under the leadership of Rev. Fr. Varkey Perekkatt, SJ, initiated a Higher Education Programme by establishing St. Xavier's College, Jaipur. Since then, the college has grown manifold, serving the educational needs, not only of the people of Jaipur but also across the nation. Over the last 10 years we have grown from a sapling to a huge oak, and every year the college has reached new milestones.

In 2014, the college was declared a Christian Minority Jesuit Institution and in the same year, the status of the college was elevated to the Postgraduate level with the initiation of two courses, namely, Masters in English Litt. and Human Resource Management. In the year 2017, the college was granted Permanent Affiliation for B.A. Hons. in Economics and English Literature from the University of Rajasthan. The following year was a testament to our success as the student strength crossed over 2000, and the number of undergraduate courses rose to six – B.A.(Hons)- English, Economics, Political Science; BBA, BCA and B.Com. and postgraduate programmes turned to 5 – M.A.(English), M.A.(Econ), M.Sc. (IT), M.Com.(EAFM, ABST) and M.H.R.M. Another achievement followed in 2019 when the college got recognition under sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act 1956. In addition to this, in the same year, all the undergraduate departments along with M.A. English Literature got permanent affiliation from the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur (Rajasthan). After a magnificent decade, right in the heart of the city, the college shifted to the new campus at Nevta, Jaipur in the session 2021-22 to provide bigger and better infrastructural and academic possibilities to the students. From this session the number of undergraduate courses rose to nine with the inclusion of BA, BSc and BA (Hons) Psychology. In 2022-23, the College introduced Professional Programmes - MBA and MCA through its New Technical Institution (Xavier Institute of Management and Informatics (XIMI)). Additionally, in 2023-24, the Department of English and Business Administration were approved as Research Centres for PhD programmes.





#### THE MEANING OF THE COLLEGE EMBLEM

The motto on the College crest: 'Competence, Character and Compassion' encodes the core values sought by the College and challenges every student who passes through the portals of St. Xavier's College to realize in one's own life the high ideals of the College: acquiring personal integrity and excellence in everything one does.



The **Burning Lamp** represents Lord Jesus Christ who said, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12), and the Wisdom of God. True education leads one from the darkness of ignorance to the light of genuine knowledge and enlightenment.

The **Open Book** symbolizes the centuries-old quality educational tradition of the Jesuits and their commitment to carry it forward. The inscription "**IHS**" placed above the open book, is taken from the official seal of the Society of Jesus, used by the



founder St. Ignatius of Loyola. These are the first three letters of the Latinised Greek word **IHSOUS**, **meaning 'Jesus'**. The cross shown above the letter 'H' reminds the world that Jesus Christ died on the Cross for the salvation of humankind.



**The Peacock** is the national bird of India. It symbolizes beauty, grace, and pride in the natural resources and cultural diversity of India. It inspires a sense of mysticism encouraging us to aim for higher values.






#### UNIVERSAL APOSTOLIC PREFERENCES (UAPs)

The Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAP) that are the fruit of a process of discernment have been laid down to carry forward the vision of Ignatius. The Preferences give a horizon, a point of reference to the whole Society of Jesus. These new Preferences are four areas vital for our world today. Jesuits around the globe will pay special attention to these UAPs in the next ten years, 2019-29. The UAPs are:

- 1. Showing the way to God In other words, to show the way to God through Spiritual Exercises and discernment.

- 4. Caring for our Common Home Collaborate, with Gospel depth, for the protection and renewal of God's Creation (economically weaker sections of society).





#### **OUR INSPIRATION**

The education offered at St. Xavier's College Jaipur aspires to reach the lofty ideals of St. Ignatius that are encapsulated in the Magis, meaning "better than the best". Every activity of the College is in line with the definite stand taken by the Society of Jesus about this ideal in the field of education, all over the world. - 4. Value-based Leadership: by ensuring a consistent focus on personal integrity and ethical behavior in all professions, and the appropriate balance between justice and fairness.
- 5. Commitment to Excellence: by applying well-learned lessons and skills to achieve new ideas, better solutions and vital answers.
- 6. Relevant to the Times: by adapting to concrete situations, politically, socially, and culturally.
- 7. Service that Promotes Justice: by using learning and leadership in openhanded and generous ways to ensure freedom of inquiry, the pursuit of truth, and care for others.
- 8. Participative: by encouraging interaction among the pupil, parents, and teachers.



### COLLEGE FACILITIES

# **Arrupe Central Library**

- Arrupe Central Library is a state-of-the-art library, well equipped with modern infrastructure, ensuring inclusivity.
- The library professionals and other team members at SXCJ Library are well qualified and well trained, with rich experience to provide optimum services and facilities to the users at all times.
- The carpet area of the college Library is 5686.49 (in sq. ft.) and has two floors, first floor is the reading room and the ground floor is the stack room with a separate reference section.
- The library is fully automated with KOHA-integrated Library Management Software version 23.11.03 and integrated with RFID technology.
- The library catalogue is web-enabled and can be accessed through sxcipr.edu.in.
- Books are classified and arranged according to DDC (Dewey Decimal Classification). Each shelf has a shelf list, which indicates rack number, shelf number, class number, and subjects concerned.
- The library uses MARC 21 format for bibliographic data capture and AACR-2 to catalog the library books with an Open Access System.
- It is a well-established e-learning resource Centre with LAN and the best internet bandwidth connectivity.
- The library also offers a book bank facility.
- The library has a membership for accessing consortium e-resources from N-LIST & DELNET.
- Access to JSTOR is provided through N-LIST (INFLIBNET).
- University question papers from previous years are available through DSpace software, and hard copies of question papers are also available in the library.
- It has an RFID self-service kiosk for issue/return/renewal students and a separate RFID Staff station for issue/return for faculty members.
- The Anti-Theft Security Gate ensures no books are taken out of the library without due process.
- The computerized IN-OUT system at the library entrance can be used using both biometrics and ID cards.
- Round-the-clock surveillance is made through the CCTVs.



- *Divyangjan* Device for visually impaired students, Ramp and Sensor Gate for *Divyangjan* ensures easy accessibility.
- The library provides readers with the latest information, making the library more inclusive of reading resources through new arrivals.

## **Transportation**

The College has made a safe and secure arrangement of transport facilities for students. It is available in all major areas of Jaipur. The College has issued guidelines regarding the same which all the students have to follow, failing which they can be denied this facility. Transport facilities with reasonable rates will be provided to students admitted to St. Xavier's College Jaipur from all the major areas of the city. The Transporter is providing GPS-enabled buses for the students.

The transportation fees for the current academic session (2023-2024) will be applicable from July 2023 to June 2024. It shall be paid in two installments.

- The first installment i.e. for the first semester (July to December 2023) shall be paid by the student during the document verification process for the First year, Second and Third year UG students, and Final-year PG students.
- 2. The second instalment shall be paid by St. Xavier's College Jaipur ONLY for those students who fulfil the following eligibility criteria:
  - A minimum of 70% attendance till December 2023 (I Semester) and from January 2024 to April 2024 (II Semester).
  - Appearance in Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) Examination.
  - Participation in all the Curricular and Extra-Curricular Activities. There should be no Disciplinary issue against the student.
  - Good use of the library facility.

NB: Those students who do not meet the eligibility criteria for transportation scholarship, will have to pay by themselves.

## Sports & Yoga

Sports play a pivotal role in shaping one's personality and maintaining good health. St. Xavier's College Jaipur provides facilities for students to cultivate a sports-oriented environment on campus, allowing those interested to participate in tournaments organized by various institutions. This enables our



students to represent the college at national and international levels. The campus features a versatile sports infrastructure, including a multi-purpose

# Gender Study and Women's Cell (GSWC)

- 6. Promoting the student's development in all aspects of personal (mental, emotional, social, physical) well-being and academic growth

# **National Cadet Corps (NCC)**

The NCC (Naval Wing) was started by the College in July 2023 under 3 Raj Naval NCC Unit, Jaipur. The maximum authorized vacancy in the Naval NCC Unit is 80. This opportunity is available for both boys and girls admitted in the first year of undergraduate regular programs (Minimum 03-year duration) only.

The selection of cadets is strictly supervised by the NCC Unit/Battalion. Cadets in NCC are taught and trained about the Indian Defence Services (Naval). Technical, administration, and social approaches are covered during the 3 years course. Every year, cadets are required to undergo an Annual Training Camp and participate in several activities organized by the unit.

Cadets are also required to participate in several university activities as ordered by NCC Incharge and CTOs. The cadets are taught and trained to clear B and C certificate exams conducted by NCC Headquarters.

A cadet with a "C" certificate gets advantages at various levels in admission and/or recruitment in different states of India. As a mandate of NEP-2020. NCC has now become a part of the college curriculum and is offered as a subject under the category of Value-Added Courses (theory and practical) to enrolled cadets only.





## **National Service Scheme (NSS)**

The National Service Scheme, popularly known as NSS, was launched in 1969 - the birth centenary year of Mahatma Gandhi- in 37 universities involving 40,000 students. It focuses on student volunteers' personality development through community service. Today, NSS has more than 3.4 million volunteers on its roll spread over 301 Universities, 42 (+2) Senior Secondary Councils, and the Directorate of Technical Education all over

the country. Since its inception, more than 3.75 crore students from various institutions of higher learning have benefitted from this scheme.

The 'Regular Activities' and 'Special Camping Programmes' are the two main components of the NSS calendar. During the two-year volunteering period, the volunteers devote 240 hours to Regular Activities. This includes 20 hours of general orientation regarding NSS and the mode of work they have to do as volunteers. Out of the remaining 220 hours, 30 hours are given for campus development, and the remaining 190 hours are for service in the community in various areas as per need and priority. Every volunteer has to attend one special camping programme to become eligible for getting the NSS Certificate issued by the Universities and +2 councils. This residential camp is 7 days in duration and is organised in the village adopted by the NSS units based on specific themes that keep on changing from time to time.

NSS, over the years, has made outstanding contributions in the fields of Mass Literacy, environmental preservation, Waste Land development, Watershed Management, Health Education, Community Development, Disaster Management, Adolescent Health Development, HIV/AIDS Awareness, Drive against Social evils, Homes for the Homeless, Mass Forestation Drives, Communal, and Social Harmony, etc. NSS Volunteers have always come to the forefront to extend voluntary service in natural calamities like drought, flood, Tsunami, cyclones, earthquakes, etc. As part of the environment conservation and enrichment project, more than 37, 06,075 saplings were planted throughout the nation by the NSS volunteers under regular activities. NSS volunteers have undertaken some innovative projects like avenue plantation, and plant identification and conducted a large number of plantation camps during the VAN MAHOTSAV week.



# Institutional Social Responsibility & Extension Activities Cell (ISREAC) / Unnat Bharat Abhivan Cell

In our college, we have incorporated this process through various activities and channels, achieving positive results. The Institutional Responsibility & Extension Activities Cell / Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Cell is one of the significant initiatives of St. Xavier's College Jaipur for students under the guidance of our college management. Through UBA, we aim to advance the concept of being sensitive to the needs of society across various departments of our college.

The efforts of UBA can make a difference that may bring about greater change in society in the future. UBA provides a platform for our students to explore

and pursue their passions, enabling them to positively impact the society we live in. The focus is to help students understand that the contribution of the community is far greater in their lives than their own contribution to the community. In the process, students have the opportunity to discover their individuality and create their own identity while remaining humble and selfless. They are exposed to firsthand problems and challenges faced by society, sensitizing them to these issues so that they become responsible citizens and serve society. These extension activities develop the emotional, intellectual, and social faculties of the learners.

## **Anti-ragging Committee**

Under the guidelines issued by the UGC, the College has constituted an Antiragging committee to ensure a ragging-free campus. The Government and the University have issued detailed instructions about the banning of any sort of Ragging in the College campus by any student. All forms of ragging are prohibited in college. If any incident of ragging comes to the notice of the authorities, the student will be allowed to explain. If the explanation is not found to be satisfactory, the authorities can expel him/her from the College. In addition, students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that provides a safe working environment for women.



# **Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)**

In compliance with the guidelines of the University Grants Commission (UGC) and the Supreme Court of India, St. Xavier's College Jaipur, has constituted an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) to uphold a safe, respectful, and inclusive environment for students, faculty, and non-teaching staff. The ICC aims to prevent sexual harassment, promote gender sensitivity, and provide a platform for the redressal of complaints as per legal and institutional guidelines. The ICC is empowered to investigate complaints of sexual harassment and recommend actions in accordance with the provisions of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal) Act, 2013, the Vishaka Guidelines, and instructions from the Government of India. It ensures that every inquiry is conducted impartially and confidentially, adhering to established legal procedures.

St. Xavier's College Jaipur is committed to fostering a campus culture free of harassment, intimidation, exploitation, or violence. The institution promotes equality, dignity, and mutual respect, ensuring a conducive atmosphere where students and staff can thrive without fear or discrimination. All members are encouraged to be aware of their rights and responsibilities to maintain a gender-sensitive and harassment-free workplace, supporting the college's strong stance against any form of gender-based violence or discrimination.

## **Students' Council**

The Students' Council is the representative body of the entire student community of the College. It serves as an interface between the students, professors, and the Management, working together to identify and address concerns that affect the students directly and indirectly. It represents the interests of the students and participates in discussions and decisions that affect the student community.

The Students' Council aims at the all-around development of students and organises several extra-curricular events throughout the year in association with the various units of the college, along with coordinating college events that are organised annually. It also provides an opportunity to be a part of activities motivated by a sense of social responsibility and aimed at giving back to society. The office bearers of the Students' Council, including the



Class Representatives from every department, are elected for a term of one year, and the core council is constituted of nominated/co-opted/elected members of the student council that functions as the backbone of the students' council.

#### **Functions of the Students' Council:**

- 1. To provide students with an opportunity to develop leadership skills by organising and managing college/inter-college events and activities.
- 2. To work in coordination with management, staff, and students for the benefit of the college. To officially represent all the students in the college.
- 3. To propose various events and activities in the college and get their approval from the authorities responsible for the students' council.
- 4. To frame the activity calendar for the whole year with the help of faculty coordinators. To conduct and organise various activities mentioned in the activity calendar.
- 5. To carry on college traditions and customs.
- 6. To develop the feeling of belongingness and respect among the students about the college. To utilize the college resources efficiently and effectively.
- 7. To maintain, build, and encourage good relationships with other colleges.
- 8. To promote student participation in college/inter-college events and activities.

## **Benefits of the Students' Council:**

- The students' council helps in the overall development of the students. The benefits of this committee are as follows: -
- This committee increases the participation of students in all kinds of cocurricular and extra-curricular activities.
- Create awareness among students about different co-curricular and extracurricular activities to be organised by different institutes.
- Help in the seamless organisation of college-level activities.
- This committee helps in building leadership quality, organisational skills, and teamwork among students.
- Promote and develop entrepreneurial skills in students.
- This committee helps students to display and practice their talents other than academics. Provide a platform to improve communication skills among students.



## **Policy Guidelines for Students' Council**

## • Nomination for the post of Class Representative

The Students' Council invites applications for the post of Class Representative from second and third-year students of all the departments at the beginning of the academic session. Interested students who fulfill the eligibility criteria submit their nominations by sending their CVs and copies of all the supporting documents to their respective Class Mentors.

# Eligibility criteria for submitting nominations for CR

The candidate should have scored a minimum of 50% score in the last qualifying exam. The third-year candidates should have a minimum of 60% and the second-year candidates should have 70% attendance in the academic session 2022-23. The candidate should not have supplementary/ backlog in any of the subjects in any year. There should not have been any disciplinary inquiry or action taken/pending against them. The candidate should not have been detained from any of the activities of the college due to a shortage of attendance and should not have any pending fees.

## • Eligibility to vote in the elections in the College

The students should carry their new RFID identity cards. Fee defaulters will not be allowed to vote. Students should not have any disciplinary action against them.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE GUIDELINES AND NORMS

For St. Xavier's College, like any other Jesuit Institution, discipline goes beyond mere adherence to rules and regulations. Discipline is looked upon as a means to inculcate into one's being the spirit of integrity and academic honesty, respect for the dignity and rights of individuals, and deference for public and personal property. The Management, along with every staff member of the College, is expected to contribute to the cultivation of such discipline within the campus.

Thus, staff members, upon noticing disciplinary infringements, are authorized to intervene and take appropriate action in consultation with the Vice Principal and ultimately the Principal. To ensure such a disciplined environment, the College has put in place Rules & Regulations.

## GOVERNMENT REGULATIONS ON RAGGING & SUBSTANCE **ABUSE**

- Ragging, of whatever kind, is strictly forbidden and will result in the dismissal of the student who engages in ragging, even if the act is committed outside the college campus. As per a Supreme Court order dated May 2007, the College authorities may also file an F.I.R. with the police if a case of ragging is reported/detected.
- The possession and/or consumption of drugs, cigarettes, or alcohol on campus will lead to immediate suspension or dismissal of that student - at the discretion of the Principal. Physical violence also attracts the same penalty. In both cases, the College may file an F.I.R. with the police.

#### GUIDELINES TO USE COLLEGE FACILITIES

# 1. Discipline and Decorum

• Maintenance of classroom cleanliness is the responsibility of students who occupy those spaces. They are expected to inform the College Administrative Office if the classroom was untidy when they enter it.





- Switching off the classroom lights and fans when not in use is a good green practice that all classroom users should follow.
- In the College Laboratories, students are expected to closely follow the instructions of the Staff-in-Charge. Strict action will be taken against those who flout the Laboratory Rules.
- The Class Noticeboards / College Website must be visited by every student on every working day to check for notices and updates. The onus of updating oneself vis-à-vis the notices rests on the students.
- In the Canteen, students are expected to return the used plates and cutlery into the basket kept for that purpose. Similarly, used paper cups and plates and empty packets and bottles should be dumped into the bins kept for that purpose. Keeping the Canteen clean and tidy (and so hygienic) is also the responsibility of the students. Wasting food should be absolutely avoided.
- The College Gym is available to all students during the time announced by the Sports Director. Those using the gym facilities are urged to use them properly. Eatables are prohibited in the gym.
- Students are encouraged to participate in the various sports tournaments that the college organizes.
- Toilets are expected to be used in a hygienic manner. Users are expected to shut the taps after use, as well as if they find them left open or dripping. It would save an important natural resource if such leakages are reported to the College Infrastructure Committee or Administrative Office.
- Encouraging or participating in any form of ragging is strictly prohibited.
- Forcible disruption of classes is not tolerated.
- Destruction of college properties, including library books, desks, benches, and any other college possessions, is strictly forbidden.
- Any form of misbehaviour towards girls, women, as well as teaching and non-teaching staff, is unacceptable.
- Misleading the college authorities by providing incorrect information is strictly against the rules.
- Engaging in any activity that is detrimental to the academic atmosphere of the college is not allowed.
- Students are expected to maintain a neat appearance and are not permitted to wear dirty or ragged clothing.
- The college encourages good personal hygiene and adherence to generally accepted hygiene practices.



The college emphasises the importance of creating a respectful, safe, and academically focused environment for all its members. Any violation of these guidelines will be dealt with seriously, and appropriate disciplinary action will be taken. Students are expected to uphold these standards and contribute positively to the overall ethos of the college community.

## 2. Library

- Library books will be issued only upon showing the College Identity card. Students should enter the library through the IN-OUT SYSTEM when checking in and ensure to check out when leaving.
- Reference books, magazines, and journals will not be issued. The time to issue and return books will be from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm.
- Books will be issued to a student for a maximum period of 15 days. After that, the books may be reissued or returned, or else, a fine of Rs. 2/- per day per book will be charged.
- A student can get a book reissued up to a maximum of two times.
- The librarian may recall any book from any member at any time, and the member shall return the same immediately.
- If a student loses a library book, then he/she has to replace it or pay the cost of the latest edition.
- If papers are torn off or the book is found damaged, the student has to either replace the book or deposit the cost of the book, including its latest edition.
- Students are required to handle books and journals very carefully; marking with a pencil, writing or highlighting, tearing the pages, or mutilating the book in any other way will be taken very seriously. In such cases, the reader shall be held responsible unless these issues are brought to the notice of the library staff at the time of issuing the book.
- Students should return books within a week after completing their respective semester/yearly examinations; otherwise, a fine will be charged.
- Each student shall obtain a No Dues Certificate from the library after returning all the books issued upon leaving the college or at the end of the semester/year.
- Students can demand or request any book through the library webpage.
- Bags and personal books are not allowed in the library. The students are expected to maintain silence in the library.





• No discussion is permitted inside the library, and the use of mobile phones is restricted.

## 3. Computer Lab

- Enter quietly and sit on your pre-allotted PCs. Do not carry bags to the Computer Labs.
- Make sure you leave your work area neat and organised.
- No food and drinks are allowed in the lab.
- Do not move any equipment from its original position.
- Do not touch equipment(s) without permission.
- Do not change the settings on the computer.

#### 4. Studio

- Studio facilities are available for the College and departmental programmes /functions. Students with prior permission of the head or the teacher coordinator can approach the studio in charge for permission to avail the facility of the Studio.
- Timing and duration will be allotted by the studio in charge.
- Only two people will be allowed at a time for a particular work. No eatables are allowed in the studio.
- Do not reconfigure any of the studio hardware or software without the permission of the studio incharge.
- Maintain silence and discipline when working in the studio.
- Treat the studio and its equipment with care and consideration for others. Help maintain a conducive atmosphere for creative work.
- Do not download any software without permission.
- Visit approved internet sites only.
- Switch off all power supplies before leaving the lab.

### RFID-INTEGRATED ID CARDS

- RFID-integrated ID cards have been prepared and distributed for the students of the academic session 2024-25. It is an advanced card system where attendance can be registered within the campus for curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities.
- Once the ID card is received, it should be worn around the neck from the time the student enters the campus.
- The ID card should be kept in good condition without any damage.





- In case the card is lost, the student should report to the College Office with a FIR and procure the new one with a penalty.
- The use of the RFID card of another student and the lending of an RFID card to another is unacceptable and will lead to suspension from the College.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

- All the first-year students (NEP Batch) have to mandatorily maintain a minimum of 75% attendance in the Value-Added Course (VAC), Skill Enhancement Course (SEC), and Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) individually apart from the major and minor subjects of your respective program.
- If anyone fails to have a minimum of 75% attendance, he/she will not be allowed to appear for the Mid-term Exams (conducted by the College) which is a minimum condition to be eligible to appear for End Semester Exams (conducted by the University of Rajasthan). The candidates should have a minimum of 60% and the second-year candidates should have 70% attendance in the academic session 2022-23. for participating in any event organized in the college.
- Students going for Sports, NCC/NSS camps, cultural competitions and other extracurricular activities as on duty should get prior permission from the Principal through the professor- in charge of these programs.
- Failure to observe rules regarding attendance will entail the loss of attendance and this may disqualify the student from appearing for the University Examinations.
- In case of prolonged absence because of medical reasons, a medical certificate ought to be submitted to the Principal within fifteen Days of absence.

#### FEE PAYMENT

The fee structure is determined by JXEA from time to time and St. Xavier's College Jaipur reserves the right to change it at any time. In the academic year 2024-25, the fee will be paid in two installments. The first installment is due in the month of July and the second in November.



#### SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA AND PROCESS

St. Xavier's College Jaipur offers Institutional as well as Government Scholarships for students of all disciplines taking admission in session 2024-25. Eligible students can avail of both Central & State Government Scholarships through the College portal. The Institutional Scholarships based on need and merit are given on the grounds of compassion and discretion to those students with good academic performance and conduct along with the needed attendance (More than 75%). Additionally, the college offers free shipping to students under Student Enrichment, Transport, Sports, and others. Scholarship and Fee Concession applications will be considered only after the second internal exam at the end of the session (Applicants need to clear both Mid-semester Exams conducted by the College), and students should fulfil the required criteria for availing the same.

## Merit-based scholarship Criteria:

To avail of the Admission Scholarship based on merit, payment of the first instalment is mandatory. Scholarships to meritorious students will be considered only after valid proof from concerned schools is submitted. Only top-scorers from each department batch will be selected for this merit-based scholarship. The maximum number of students from each class will depend upon the numerical strength of each class. They will be given 70%, 60%, 50%, 40%, and 30% reduction in the tuition fees respectively. The final decision will be made by the College Management.

# Good Academic performance:

- Percentage above the cut-off marks in the last Qualifying Exam.
- Students need to clear both the internal exams for the session.
- Good Conduct in the College.
- They should have maintained at least 75 % attendance in the academic year.

Only the top-scoring students from each batch in every department will be selected for merit-based scholarships. The College Management reserves to itself all decisions which will be final and binding on all.

## **Need-based Scholarships Criteria:**

Need-based scholarships are given on the grounds of compassion and discretion of the Management. It is open only to such students in need of economic assistance with the following conditions:

- Good Academic performance.
- Interested students need to clear both the Internal Exams of the session.





- Good conduct in the College.
- They should have maintained at least 75% attendance in the academic year.
- Have a family income less than INR 2.5 Lakh per annum\* (income certificate proofs to be provided with application) (\*minimum income slab as prescribed by Central Govt).
- For Need-based Scholarships, concessions up to 50 % in Tuition Fees will be granted.

Being a Christian Minority Jesuit College, Christian/Catholic students are offered a concession of 50% in tuition fees along with an additional 25% concession in Tuition Fees, provided such candidates fulfil the abovementioned conditions for the Need-based Scholarships. It is also mandatory for them to deposit the first instalment of the fees. (Christian/Catholic students need to submit a valid Recommendation letter from Parish Priest/ Bishops/ Letter approved by the Church). Such candidates cannot avail of the benefits of any other scholarship scheme if he/she obtains benefits from JXEA scholarships.

# Criteria for Sport Scholarships:

**International Players:** An international player will be given a scholarship at the time of admission if he/she has represented India or played internationally in a team or individual game. Only the admission fees and alumni fees will be paid by the player at the time of admission. However, if he/she does not play at the international level in the second year, his/her scholarship will be reduced by 75%, and if this continues in the third year, only 50% will be reduced. If the student's performance improves or deteriorates, he or she will be awarded a scholarship based on performance.

National Players: If a player is a national champion or runner-up, his/her 50% fee will be waived at the time of admission, leaving only the admission and alumni fees to be paid. If the student does not continue to represent at the national level, only 25% of the fees will be waived off in the second year, and if the student's performance is below par in the third year, the student must pay the full fees for the third year. If a player continues to play at the national level, his/her scholarship will be renewed; if his performance improves, the scholarship will be renewed based on improved performance. If a student has national-level participation at the time of admission, he or she will receive a 25% fee concession. If the student's performance improves or deteriorates, he or she will be awarded a scholarship based on performance.

Important Guidelines for Players:





- The player is obliged to notify the concerned Head of the Department as well as the Head of the Department of Physical Education.
- Attendance will be relaxed for all players, with proper approval and information given to the Head of the Department of Physical Education, and the same permission should be received from the respective departmental HoDs.
- For the second and third years of the scholarship, the student must always notify the Head of the Department of Physical Education about their performance/progress in their respective games. The student will not be considered for the scholarship in the second and third years if the Head of the Department of Physical Education is unaware of the student's performance.
- Students will receive additional medals and other perks at the annual prize distribution ceremony for their exceptional performances. Sports certificates from the last two academic years are required, and older certificates will not be accepted.

Note: If a student falls into more than one category, he/she can apply for only one scholarship.

#### MENTORING SYSTEM

- St. Xavier's College has implemented a robust Mentor-Mentee System designed to foster a deeper connection between teachers and students. Each student is assigned a dedicated Mentor who provides personalized guidance and counseling through regular group meetings.
- Mentor's Role: The Mentor is there to offer support, advice, and assistance, ensuring students' academic and personal well-being throughout the journey of a student at St. Xavier's College.
- Regular Meetings: Mentors and mentees convene in groups regularly, facilitating open communication and addressing any concerns that students may have.
- Parent-Teacher Meetings: Class-wise parent-teacher meetings are scheduled at the conclusion of each term, following internal exams. These meetings serve as a platform to discuss academic results, performance, and the overall conduct of students both at home and within the College.
- The college believes in the importance of fostering a supportive learning community, and the Mentor-Mentee System is a key component of this commitment. The students and parents are encouraged to actively participate in these interactions to ensure a holistic and enriching educational experience.

### ACADEMIC GUIDELINES AND NORMS

### ATTENDANCE CRITERIA

- All first-year and second-year students (NEP Batch) must maintain a minimum of 75% attendance in the Value-Added Course (VAC), Skill Enhancement Course (SEC), and Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) individually, apart from the major and minor subjects of their respective program. Failure to meet this attendance requirement will result in the student not being allowed to appear for the Mid-term Exams conducted by the College, which is a minimum condition for eligibility to appear for End Semester Exams conducted by the University of Rajasthan.
- Third-year candidates should maintain a minimum of 50% attendance, and first-year and second-year students (NEP Batch) must maintain a minimum of 75% attendance in the academic session 2024-25 to participate in any event organized in the college.
- Students participating in Sports, NCC/NSS camps, cultural competitions, and other extracurricular activities on duty must obtain prior permission from the Principal through the professor-in-charge of these programs.
- Failure to adhere to attendance rules will result in the loss of attendance, potentially disqualifying the student from appearing for University Examinations.
