The Syndicate at its special meeting held on 29.08.2025 has approved the following new Ordinances related to NEP-2020 :-

- (I) Ref.: Academic Council Res. No. 18 dated 13.08.2025 and Syndicate Res. No. 19-1.1 dated 29.08.2025.

The following new Ordinances be added after Ordinances 199-G

1. New Ordinance (Ord. 199 H. 1 to Ord. 199 H. 8) related to Examination reforms in Post-Graduate Courses (Semester Scheme).

### **NEW ORDINANCES RELATED TO EXAMINATION REFORMS IN POST-GRADUATE COURSES (SEMESTER SCHEME)**

**O.199H1:** The examination of Regular and Non-Collegiate students of Master degree (Post graduate) Programmes of the University admitted in the academic session 2025-26 and after shall be based on (a) Semester Examinations, (b) Continuous- Assessment, (c) Choice Based, Credit System, and (d) 10 grade point Scale (e) Semester Grade Point, Average and Cumulative Grade Point Average system as provided in O.199F1 to O.199F5. The ordinances which were in force prior to the academic session 2025-26 will be applicable for non-collegiate students (wherever permissible) and students admitted prior to the academic session 2025-26 only. From Academic Session 2025-2026, the ordinances O.199H1 to O.199H8 will have an overriding effect over other ordinances for the programmes leading to a Master's degree.

**O.199H2:** Fifteen (15) hours of theory teaching will lead to one credit (which means one hour per week theory teaching in a semester of 90 teaching days) and in case of practical 60 hours of laboratory work will lead to two credits (which means 4 hours practical class per week in a semester of 90 teaching days). Each semester of the Master's course shall offer 36 credits or more. The number of Semester Examinations and the Minimum credits required to be earned for the award of a Master's degree in various post-graduate courses is specified in the table given below.

\*Candidates who have been admitted to a Master's degree in Anthropology/Garment Production and Export Management/Geography/Mathematics/Psychology/Statistics based on the Bachelor's degree in Arts shall be awarded the M.A. Degree in the concerned subject and candidates who have been admitted to the Master's degree in Garment Production and Export Management based on the Bachelor's degree in Commerce shall be awarded the M.Com. degree in the subject.

The number of papers, course type and credits and a detailed syllabus for each course shall be shown in the syllabus for the course concerned. A candidate will be required to earn a minimum of credits prescribed above for the award of the Master's degree.

**O.199H3:**

- (a) The Department, in the context of this ordinance, means the Department/Centre of the concerned PG subject at the University of Rajasthan or that of an affiliated institution or college, as the case may be. Teacher of the parent Department means a duly appointed

Teacher as per UGC prescribed qualifications in the Department where the student is enrolled for the course.

- (b) The Credit Courses have been classified as
- i. Compulsory Core Courses (CCC)
  - ii. Elective Core Courses (ECC),
  - iii. Seminar (SEM), Project Work (PRJ), Field Study (FST), Self-Study Courses (SSC), and other Supportive Courses (OSC), Research Publications (RPJ) can also be taken in support of Core or Elective courses wherever so prescribed. **These courses shall be applicable to regular students only.**
- (c) A Credit Monitoring Committee (CMC) of the Department will consist of the Head/Principal and THREE Senior Most Teachers on roll of the Department/College with the Head/Principal of the Department/College as Chairperson. Under special circumstances, when the number of teachers on roll is less than four, the Vice-Chancellor/Principal may constitute the Credit Monitoring Committee. Registration of candidates in the First and subsequent Semesters after the prescribed last date shall not be permitted. For subsequent semesters, no minimum credit earning criterion will be applicable. Credit registration at least once in all Compulsory Credit Courses shall be binding; however, earning all CCC Credits for accumulation of the prescribed minimum credits with a grade C or higher in all CCC will be binding. The curriculum of a programme shall not have more than 60% of the minimum credit required as a compulsory core course (CCC). The final CGPA shall be worked out on the basis of the best performance in the minimum credit required for the award of the degree in various courses, including all CCC credit courses.
- (d) The candidate will be required to finalize the number of credits at the time of registration in a semester, and no change will be permitted after seven days of the start of the semester. The CMC of the Department shall forward the credit registration details of all students enrolled in the semester, latest by the tenth day of commencement of the semester. The prior approval of the Credit Monitoring Committee will be essential, and the decision of the Credit Monitoring Committee shall be final and binding.
- (e) The seminar aims to give students an exposure to recent developments and advanced topics of research interest. The Seminar preparations can be undertaken only with the prior approval of the Credit Monitoring Committee of the Department. The CMC will allot Seminar Credits on a Merit Basis to deserving students. Seminar preparations are to be undertaken under the guidance of a teacher of the parent Department. The guiding teacher will make a continuous internal assessment of the Seminar. At the End of the Semester Examination (EoSE) the Seminar will be conducted, and credits will be awarded by a

Board of Three Examiners consisting of the Head of the Department, the guide, and one faculty Member other than the guide.

- (f) The aim of Project Work or Field Study is to introduce students to research methodology in the subject and prepare them for pursuing research in theoretical or experimental, or computational areas of the subject. The project work or Field Study is to be undertaken under the guidance of a Teacher of the Department or a Scientist or any other suitable person with proven research excellence in the concerned field of study. The Project Work or Field Study can also be taken up in an outside institution of repute on approval by the Credit Monitoring Committee of the Department. The Project Work or Field Study can be undertaken only with the prior approval of the Credit Monitoring Committee of the Department. The CMC will allot Project Work or Field Study Credits on a Merit Basis out of desirous students. The guiding teacher will make a continuous internal assessment of the Project Work/Field Study. EoSE for Project Work/Field Study will be held at the unit where project work has been undertaken by a board of three examiners consisting of HoD, the guide and one senior faculty.
- (g) Each department is required to arrange delivery of all compulsory core courses and a special number of elective core courses so that the students enrolled for the courses can complete the prescribed minimum number of credits. It is not binding on the Department to make provision for all elective core courses.
- (h) A course is identified by a course code designated by a string of six alphanumeric characters and a course title. In a course code, the first three characters of the string indicate the Department offering the course, and the last three alphanumeric characters designate a particular course. In the case of compulsory core courses, the fourth character identifies the semester numeric digit, and in the case of the elective core courses, the fourth character indicates the cluster of specialization. For compulsory theory core courses, the fifth character is '0', for laboratory core courses it is 'T', and for Project Work/Seminar/Field Study it is '2', and for Research Publications in journals it is '3'.
- (i) **O.199H3(c), O.199H3(g) are not applicable to non-collegiate students.**

**O.199H4: Learning Assessment and Evaluation Methodology:**

- a. The University shall adopt a continuous and comprehensive assessment approach to monitor regular students' academic progress and provide timely, constructive feedback aimed at enhancing learning outcomes. Assessment methods shall include, but are not limited to, regular assignments, quizzes, examinations, presentations, projects, and research papers. These methods are designed not only to evaluate the students' understanding of course content but

also to assess their analytical abilities, communication skills, and capacity to apply knowledge in practical and real-world contexts.

**(i) Regular Students**

Each course under the Choice-Based Credit System for regular students shall comprise two components :

- A. **Continuous Assessment (CA):** Constituting 20% of the total weightage, based on internal evaluations conducted throughout the semester. The internal assessment component will comprise of assessment of students' performance on the basis of factors like Attendance, Classroom Participation, Quiz, Home Assignment, etc. The sessional/midterm test shall be conducted on the coverage of 50% of the course content specified in the syllabus.
- B. **End of Semester Examination (EoSE):** For regular students End of Semester Examination shall constitute 80% of the total weightage, based on a formal written examination.
- (a) The Candidate shall not be permitted to appear in EoSE –
- (i) If he/she does not fulfil the minimum 75% attendance requirement,
- (ii) If he/she fails to secure at least 40% marks (C Grade) in each course (paper) in the Continuous Assessment.
- (b) To appear in the EoSE of a course/subject student must appear in the mid-semester examination and obtain at least a "C" grade in the Continuous Assessment of the course/subject.
- (c) If he/she failed to secure at least 40 % marks (C-Grade) in one or more courses, then he/she shall be detained from appearing EoSE examination of those course(s).
- (d) The concerned department/college shall forward the examination forms to the University only of those students who fulfil both conditions at point (a) above. The record of continuous assessment will be maintained by the department concerned".
- C. Both components shall be mandatory and contribute to the final grade of the student in each course.
- D. Credit points in a Course/Subject shall be assigned only if the student obtains at least a "C" grade both in Continuous Assessment (CA) and EoSE examination of a Course/Subject.

E. For regular students, final grade/marks in a course/subject will be calculated by adding 20% of Continuous Assessment (CA) Marks and 80% of EoSE marks in a course/subject.

**(ii) Non-Collegiate Students :**

A. There shall be no continuous assessment of non-collegiate students.

B. For non-collegiate students End of Semester Examination shall constitute 100% of the total Weightage.

C. Final Grade for non-collegiate candidates will be 100% EoSE marks in a course/Subject.

- b. For the award of a degree, a candidate must earn the minimum number of credits prescribed under Ordinance O.199H2 for the respective degree programme. Earning credits in all prescribed Compulsory Core Courses (CCC) shall be mandatory:
- c. If a student fails to secure a minimum of 40% marks (equivalent to a 'C' Grade) in the Continuous Assessment (CA) component of one or more course(s), he/she shall be required to re-register for the course(s), if they so desire, and complete it as a regular course.
- d. If a student fails to secure a minimum of 40% marks (equivalent to a 'C' Grade) in the End of Semester Examination (EoSE) of one or more courses, he/she shall be required to re-register for the course(s), if they so desire, as a Self-Study Course, and may appear in the EoSE of these courses along with the End of Semester Examinations of the current semester. That is, if the pending course(s) belong to an odd semester, the student may appear in the EoSE during the next scheduled odd semester examinations, and similarly for even semesters.
- e. There will be no supplementary/due paper/special examination. Students who have not secured a grade "C" in a course will have to get themselves re-registered in the course if they so desire, with the option either as a Self-Study Course or as a regular course. The credit will be considered and counted only if registered and approved by the Credit Monitoring Committee at the time of semester registration."
- f. The provisions of revaluation and improvement in the annual scheme examination shall also be applicable in the Semester Examination Scheme (EoSE) for PG Courses".
- g. The maximum period for accumulation of the credit for the Award of Master's degree is 4 years (7 years for Ten Semester courses). Failing which, the credits earned will stand withdrawn and null and void.

h. 40 % of the credits in Elective Core Courses may be earned through online courses such as MOOC/NPTEL/SWAYAM/SWATAM+ or any other online course approved by the University as per existing UGC regulations.

- b. Continuous assessment shall be the sole responsibility of the teacher concerned.
- c. For continuous assessment, no remuneration shall be paid for paper setting, Evaluation, Invigilation, etc.
- d. For continuous assessment, Paper setting and Evaluation responsibility shall be of the teacher's concern.
- e. For continuous assessment, no Answer sheets/question papers, etc. shall be provided by the University.
- f. Colleges/Departments are advised to keep records of continuous assessment, attendance, etc.

O.199H6: Letter Grades and Grade Points :

Each course shall be assigned a letter grade based on the student's performance, which is then converted into grade points. The letter grades and grade points provide a comprehensive assessment of students' academic achievements and shall be reflected in their transcripts.

### O.199H7: Computation of SGPA and CGPA:

The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) shall be calculated to measure students' overall performance. The SGPA shall be computed for each semester by taking the weighted average of the grade points earned in that particular semester, while the CGPA is calculated by considering the weighted average of grade points across all semesters. These indicators shall provide a comprehensive view of students' academic progress throughout their undergraduate journey.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) :

- i. The SGPA is the ratio of the sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits in all the courses undergone by a student, i.e.

$$SGPA (S_i) = \frac{\sum(C_i \times G_i)}{\sum C_i}$$

Where  $C_i$  is the number of credits of the  $i^{\text{th}}$  course and  $G_i$  is the grade point scored by the student in the  $i^{\text{th}}$  course.

- ii. The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is also calculated in the same manner, taking into account all the courses undergone by a student over all the semesters of a programme, i.e.

$$CGPA = \frac{\sum(C_i \times S_i)}{\sum C_i}$$

where  $S_i$  is the SGPA of the  $i^{\text{th}}$  semester and  $C_i$  is the total number of credits in that semester.

#### Note –

1. Marks obtained in each course and a weighted average of marks based on marks obtained in all semesters taken together shall be mentioned in the mark sheet.
2. The Letter grades, Grade Points and SGPA and CGPA shall be issued in the transcript for each semester and a consolidated transcript indicating the performance in all semesters.
3. The University will issue a complete transcript of credits, grade obtained, SGPA and CGPA on declaration of each semester result and a consolidated one on the accumulation of minimum credits required for the award of a Master's degree.

### O.199H8: Regulation-Scheme of Examination

- (1) Each theory paper EoSE shall carry 100 marks. The EoSE will be of 3 hours duration. Part 'A' of the theory paper will contain 10 short answer questions of 20 marks, based on knowledge, understanding and applications of the topics/texts covered in the syllabus. Each question will carry two marks for a correct answer.

- (2) Part "B" of the paper will consist of four questions (with internal choice) from each section of the Syllabus. The word limit for each answer will be 1000 words. Except in cases where a different scheme is specifically specified in the syllabus.
- (3) Each Laboratory EoSE shall carry 50 marks. Each Laboratory EoSE will be four hours in duration and involve laboratory experiments/exercises, and viva-voce examination with a weightage in the ratio of 75:25.
